Telling Our Story
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The number of women-owned businesses is increasing worldwide, and Haiti is following the trend. Today, more and more Haitian women are occupying higher-level decision-making positions in the workforce. Haitian women do not often have the opportunity to share their experiences or exchange best practices in building a successful career and navigating a traditional patriarchal society. In addition, young women new to the workforce seldom have the opportunity to interact with successful women in a mentorship role.

On 29 March 2019, Konbit organized a *Business Link – For Women by Women* event to showcase women's dynamic initiatives in the work place and community. This event provided a space for deep discussion around key themes affecting women in Haiti, from cultural and historical references to practical everyday challenges.

Twenty women-led businesses attended this event and showcased their wares and services at booths set up for that purpose. Service oriented companies like FHADIMAC, ProUniq and GECA presented their offerings alongside crafts and food producers such as Sandilou, F&F Foods and Myabèl. This convivial atmosphere inspired networking and comradery.

Concurrent panel discussions were held on four main themes: Women in Politics, Women in the Private Sector, Women in the Non-Profit Sector and Self-Assertiveness in the Workplace. Men and women alike attended these two-hour sessions with well recognized panelists and moderators, experts in their respective fields.

Self-Assertiveness in the Workplace was led by Phaidra Laraque and Tim Valda Jean and moderated by Monique Manigat.
